

Overall Impression of Canadian Agriculture

Non-farming Canadian Adults



52% of non-farming adults have a positive impression of Canadian agriculture.


- 42% in 2006
- Those more likely to have a positive impression of agriculture include:
 - Men
 - Higher Socio-economic Status

Level of Knowledge of Farming Practices Non-Farming Adults

Only 6% of non-farming Canadians indicate they feel they know a lot about Canadian farming practices. While 42% indicate they "know a little", 52% indicate they know "very little" or "nothing".



Those who live in rural communities are no more likely to feel they know "a lot" about farming than those who live in urban communities.


However, those who live in rural communities are more likely to "know a little" (49%) than those who live in urban communities (41%).

For consumers, traditional media is the primary conduit for information related to these topics.












Top-of-Mind Personal Concerns Relating to Farming









What are your biggest concerns about agriculture and food?






Q8. Would you like to know more about livestock farming?




Overall Impression of Individuals Non-farming Canadian Adults

Perception is cumulative. Change is incremental.




